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


Letter from the Chair

Dear Members

I hope that you are all well. This email is written in the midst of so many global issues in which questions around what it means to live an ethical life in which freedom of speech and control of others through this seem to be so dominant. It reminds me of the textile actions that the AIDS Quilt and the banners that emerged so swiftly at Ground Zero after 9/11 where textile practices became the almost automatic expression of despair and hope intermingled.

I start my letter to you with this not to overwhelm ourselves with the grim nature of human expressions of power, but to remind ourselves of the power and potency of textile practices in calling attention to and protesting against these very expressions. At Greenham Common the women sat vigil against the accumulation and deployment of trident missiles. In their activities of knitting and sewing they were both nonaggressive and yet persistent reminders of the devastation these weapons could wreak. When the police came to remove them, they frustrated those efforts by creating a tangle of threads beneath which they lay. This web reminds me of the beautiful installations of Chihara Shiota, but both speak of power structures and how frustrating them can allow space for different thinking.




Letter from the Chair cont'd

As we celebrate our 60th birthday at the Knitting & Stitching Show in the autumn (I hope you all made your submission), the various textile actions and practices of the group will come together under the title 'Essences'. This theme allows us to set out to our public what these practices can mean and do as a form of articulation of being an ethical being within the world. We have members whose work is overtly and explicitly political, members whose work deals with the waste and detritus that litters our world and others that speak of what it means to work in tandem, in co-production, with nature. These are inspiring and challenging ways of working and speak of the importance of groups such as ours.

Our members over the past 60 years have not shied away from speaking truths, speaking women's truths specifically. It seems that this need is even more urgent now and I am excited and encouraged when I look at the work of our group through this lens. These practices allow us both to speak up, but also to find beauty and energy within a world that at times can seem overwhelming and frightening.

There is much to celebrate and I thank you all for this inspiration.

2023 Exhibition - Sunny Bank Mills 'Tailored'

THE BRIEF FROM SUNNY BANK MILLS

We are delighted to invite the 62 Group of Textile Artists to develop new work exploring our theme 'Tailored'.

Tailored: from the Latin verb to cut and a word we associate particularly with suits and suiting. The cloth produced at the Mill was most commonly used for suits and although they weren't produced here, Leeds is well known as the birthplace of that great suit producer and supplier, Marks & Spencer.

62 Group members are invited to submit work that responds to the word "tailored" and its meaning to you and your practice. For example, is it the process of making, spinning yarn, designing, weaving, and dyeing cloth or the pattern cutting and sewing of a garment? Does it relate to the fabric of the Mill building or to those people that made it? Or perhaps the cloth's journey after leaving the Mill, to those who used it and wore it?

What relevance does the word "tailored" have now? Does it have connotations of gender? How has its use extended beyond textiles to explain how we adapt and respond to our circumstances? Is its meaning as simple as the word "made"?

The exhibition will take place in the Gallery, the former cloth warehouse of the Mill, a beautiful light and airy 3,000 sq ft space.

In addition, we may consider using other spaces around the Mill, particularly external spaces, and welcome proposals for site sensitive works. Please contact jane @sunnybankmills.co.uk, in the first instance, if you are interested in exploring this possibility.

Considering the Gallery's 10th Anniversary, we would particularly welcome work that responds to its heritage, although this is not essential. Tailored will be part of a programme of exhibitions and engagement that celebrates textiles and their place in the local community and economy.



Handling Collection by Lucy Brown






The 62 Group's Handling Collection has been a bit quiet in recent years but we are hoping, with your help, we can re-launch, display and use this fantastic resource at our next Exhibition 'In-Essence' at The Knitting and Stitching Show this Autumn.


The 62 Group's Handling Collection was launched in 2012 as part of the celebrations of the Group's 50th Anniversary year. The Launch included using the Handling Collection in a drawing workshop led by 62 Group Artist Rachael Howard. One of the 62 Group's aims is to 'promote and encourage greater awareness of textile art through education'. The Handling Collection sits firmly within this remit.

The Handling Collection so far consists of twenty-two 2d and 3d 'handleable' samples generously donated by 62 Group exhibiting members. These samples are catalogued along with supporting information supplied at the time of the donation. The idea of the Handling Collection is that it builds up and develops over time. It is a valuable resource and an interesting archive which engages and connects the Groups past, current, future members and audiences. The Collection is currently looked after by Lucy Brown.

The sample donation is a voluntary one.

Our Handling Collection is an education resource and there for our members to use for 62 Group education events including, but not limited to workshops, talks, discussions, etc

Emma Talbot: The Age/L'Età Review by Gavin Fry

When you step into L'Età, the Max Mara Art Prize for Women, by Emma Talbot (b. 1969, UK) these brave works at The Whitechapel Gallery ask us to contest outmoded power stories and step into a world of marvels and infernos populated by a lone female figure. Rapidly, I was immersed in this installation: I felt calmed, roused, soothed, and scared. Overwhelmingly my urge was to explore, these artworks are expeditions, and I was in them. In one huge room you become a player in two epic silk painted hangings, join in conversation with an arresting life-size sculptural figure, and savour twelve brilliant animations and four cases of intimately beautiful colour drawings.

The drawings on khadi paper are delicate and enveloping whilst the vast acrylic paintings on silk are arresting and at times accusatory - almost nosey and hectoring with each at eleven metres long and nearly four meters deep. Rich dun colours spar with copper and mauve on the taught lurex limbs of a striding figure. With her long grey hair communicating danger and deviance this older woman can (as it has throughout history) be read as a powerful symbol of defiance and transgression in the face of social and gender inequality. She is here to reclaim her agency and all that the straight gaze seeks to homogenise, extract, and sanitise. To be a witch, after all, is to be queer, and here we see the toolkit a present-day fighter arms herself with.










Emma Talbot: The Age/L'Età cont'd Review by Gavin Fry



The heroine of this narrative was partly inspired by Gustav Klimt's painting The Three Ages of Woman (1905), which features an apparently defeated elderly woman next to a younger woman and infant. In upending the image of the protagonist as inert, incapable, and ashamed, Talbot, through much visual and contextual research, re-presents her for us as a contemporary protagonist of system control (living her way through priapic lumps in a 'shitty Anthropocene' of ruins and volcanos). In praise of the pragmatic our storyteller asks: 'What if Growth came from Care?' as she has encounters in an interim realm.

Talbot's matriarch moves the human spirit; her wisdom, power and agency take her through the 12 Labours of Hercules without using any previously man-tried destructions, dominations, and oppressions to tackle climate emergency. This Hercules is recharacterized and gifted with compassion and understanding as the older woman, and the trials are metaphors for societal problems to be solved through ethical and sustainable activism.

With captivating directness this significant body of work throws a fecund shroud over a world gone bad, and with breath-taking scale and luminosity, weeds at the roots of power, governance, and man. It is an ambitious project that invites us to unravel attitudes to nature and representations of gender through an acutely humane lens. There is a complete lack of timidity and apology from this heroine (Emma Talbot) and that's very good.

2022 Selection Process

From the remaining applicants, 11 were chosen from a range of practices to move through to Stage 2 in September.


Thanks to Catherine, Teresa, Ealish, Jane, Sally and external member Yemi Awosile for being on the panel.

Film Workshop



We finally have our Film Workshop ready to view. Here's the link that will take you to the content which you can view at your own pace, in your own time. This is aimed at beginners - you only need your smart phone or tablet to film. Hopefully it'll give us all loads of tips and hints on how to best film our practice for videos to accompany exhibitions and for education events. This is for 62Group use only - not for public consumption - so please do not share this link with anybody outside our group.

You'll have a few weeks to watch the workshop and play with some of your own filming, then there will be a Q&A session with Lucy Forrester (who put the workshop together and edited our BTB video) so you can ask further questions. We'll collect questions in advance and we'll also record the session so that everyone can pick up further tips. The date for this session will follow soon.

As a reminder, below is the brief for the video that Lucy will edit for the K&S show. We are really hoping to include films from as many members as possible so please do have a go at filming once you have watched the video - Lucy's editing works magic to pull things together so please don't worry about things that will need to be cut out or spliced together!

To create enough footage that can be edited down to approx 1 minute per member. The content is to be an insight into your practice generally - studio shots, close up making, materials, tools, equipment that kind of thing. You will also need to record a separate audio track that will introduce yourself and the kinds of things you like to make work about or with.
