
Letter from the Chair

Dear Members

We have now passed the day when there is more light than darkness and it certainly feels like spring is springing. I know we British always talk about the weather, but it really is so changeable and unpredictable.

I am writing this as I travel from Dundee to Warsaw, from a conference about the future of art and design in Higher Education to a Feminist Art Practice Collective. Both are raising vital hopes and concerns as we think forward to what the legacy we are leaving the next generation. I have come away from the first very hopeful as I saw the quality, ambition and determination of those leading our art and design schools and departments. There is a burgeoning group that have written a manifesto for creative education that has been warmly received by the Labour party and the Liberal Democrats and the Conservatives had taken up one of the pledges.

These are tough times for the creative sector and from primary education through to our cultural organisations and institutions, we are seeing reduced funding and a seriously concerning level of defunding. However, Dundee is a beacon, designated as a UNESCO city of design, the new V&A museum there was buzzing with visitors and there is an amazing network of creative work taking place across the city. Communities are coming together to make art, to create and to address the concerns that the city is facing. There is a sense of urgency, but vibrancy. It is really uplifting and heartening and hopeful. I know that there are similar upswellings taking place across the country and more broadly as we look across the globe and yearn for peace.

It is into this backdrop that we place our forthcoming 'Making as Learning' exhibition and 'Tailored' part 2. We set our work as a community of makers, educators, thinkers and artists into the public sphere to spark discussion, imagination, hope and ambition. We build on the shoulders of those brave and tenacious women that started the group back in 1962. We place this work with a vision of future generations continuing the work we are doing now. This is what I think of as hopeful leadership - in this I mean we recognise and discuss and make artwork about the contemporary world that is hurting and bleeding, but we build communities that can act together to champion and heal these spaces. The work our group produces does just this - we have beautifully rendered narratives of families and landscapes, we have powerfully provocative works that call us to attend to current and past inequities, we have delicate renderings of historical and contemporary textiles, we have work that draws us into nature and to attend to its details and cycles of life. And we have so much more when this is brought together in exhibition. The relationships the artworks form across the gallery spaces allow our viewers to find their own narratives and readings.

I am always honoured and humbled by the quality of the work from the Group; I thank each and every one of you for all that you bring to the group and all that you contribute as hopeful leaders within and beyond our field. I hope that you can find joy and hope in these longer days.


Images from this year's Collect at Somerset House a few weeks ago.

Celebrating innovative textile practice by the Textile Study Group 9 January to 27 April 2024

2023 marked the 50th Anniversary of The Textile Study Group, a collective of textile artists who have been at the forefront of innovative making, teaching and textile art practice. Since its inception in 1973, and originally established to support tutors of embroidery, the group has evolved and grown in stature and is now one of the UK's most prestigious and respected groups of textile artists and tutors.

The Textile Study Group maintains a core membership of 25 experienced textile teachers, all of whom are nationally and internationally recognised for their forward-thinking and challenging approaches to art practice, contemporary teaching and making. Many members are published authors of textile, art, and design books, and many have won prizes and awards for their outstanding work.

After touring at Tweeddale Museum and Gallery at Peebles and The Ropewalk at Barton-upon-Humber in 2023, this landmark exhibition travels south to Farnham to show new audiences the broad range of the group's output. Each artwork in this anniversary exhibition includes an element of 50 – either obviously or obscurely.

The exhibition is accompanied by a limited-edition bespoke book that includes new and exciting work from their current membership, and will acknowledge those who paved the way by initiating 'Group '73', (which later evolved into the Practical Study Group, renamed the Textile Study Group in 2010).

Eszter Bornemisza Exhibition

There are two very special pieces of land in the south of the Netherlands. They are enclaves of Belgium. The border runs straight through villages and sometimes even through houses. Galerie High Five in Baarle Nassau is established in a house where you enter in the Netherlands and the back door lies several meters in Belgium.

Last Sunday, an exhibition by Eszter Bornemisza opened in High Five Art Gallery - one of the few galleries in the Netherlands completely dedicated to textiles.

Of course, we know Eszter's work well. She usually uses nets containing (news)paper figures. It is often maps that fascinate her. Her color palette is fairly consistent in ochres, oranges, browns and grays.

In this exhibition my eye was attracted to a large gray work, in which there were no maps, but all kinds of pieces of clothing were hidden - collars, gloves and lace. (I only have detail photos of this work).

It was wonderful to see Eszter and some Dutch textile friends.





Artist Collective StiQS

This is an exhibition of StiQS, a group of 8 textile artists in the Netherlands Flox den Hartog Jager is a member of.

In the autumn of 2022, the members of the artist collective StiQS started a new adventure. Normally textile is the medium of their art. Textiles are soft, tactile, supple, delicate and vulnerable. In addition, it is weak and does not form into a truly spatial form without tricks (folds, ribs, hardening or a supporting material such as iron wire).

Now StiQS investigated a completely different material. Metal is hard, shiny, but still tactile. It will be clear that such a completely different material brought completely new challenges: cutting was replaced by sawing, embroidery by rolling and hammering, and our needle by a nail or drill.

The experienced goldsmith Pauline Barendse gave a brief insight into metalworking in three lessons. One of those lessons took place in the silver studio of the Silver Museum. The artists then continued their search with the jewellery shown here as the end result.

Of course, textile artists with their limited (material) knowledge cannot compete with well-trained silver and goldsmiths. But they can give their own interpretation of the material and try to bridge the two worlds that are central to this exhibition: textile and metal.




